Year 3 trip to Creswell Crags

Our History trip to Creswell Crags this year was extra special; for the first time, we were given special permission to visit Church Hole Cave – a cave on the opposite side of the gorge to the cave that we would normally visit. Here the children were shown cave art dating back 12000 years; they could make out the engraved picture of a deer and an ibis and saw examples of early counting/tallies on the walls.



This proved good inspiration for their own cave art which they created back at the visitors' centre, using a selection of sticks, stones, feathers and sponges to draw Stone Age animals that might have roamed the countryside around Creswell.

Other activities involved pretending to be archaeologists, examining the contents of trenches to find clues about how Stone Age people lived. They also tried to identify objects that would have been used for hunting.

How to Pack your shoebox gift

How to pack your shoebox

- Fill your shoebox with a variety of new gifts that a child will love. Why not add a personal note and photo, and you may also like to pray for the child who will receive your box?
- Include a £3 shipping donation for each shoebox you fill. If you make this payment online, you can print out a barcode and place it inside your shoebox on top of the contents. This will enable us to tell you which country your shoebox gets sent to.
- Secure your shoebox with an elastic band and take it to your nearest drop off point between 1–18 November. All sites will be listed on the website from late October at www.operationchristmaschild.org.uk.

Gift Suggestions

Please fill your box with a selection from the following or similar items.

All items should be new.

TOYS Include a toy that a child can love like a doll or a cuddly toy (with CE label), toy truck, skipping rope, yoyo, ball, small puzzle, musical instruments etc.

SCHOOL SUPPLIES Pens, colouring pencils, sharpener & eraser, crayons, felt pens, stamp & ink pad sets, writing pads or notebooks and paper, colouring & picture books, solar calculators etc.

HYGIENE ITEMS Toothbrush, toothpaste, bars of wrapped soap, flannel, comb & brush etc.

OTHER ITEMS Hat, cap, gloves, scarf, sunglasses (with UV rating), hair accessories, wind- up torch, jewellery set, wrapped sweets (with best before date of at least March the following year).

You could also include a **PERSONAL NOTE AND PHOTO** of you and your family/group.
